COVID-19 immunization plan - next steps

On October 26, the Province released news that a third dose and booster shots of the COVID-19 vaccine will be available for all British Columbians 12+ beginning in January 2022. The Province will continue its COVID-19 immunization plan with first priority going to BC's elderly and most at-risk through to the December holiday.

Currently, the mRNA vaccines (Moderna Spikevax and Pfizer Comirnaty) are the two options for the third dose and booster shots. People who received the AstraZeneca vaccine initially will be offered an mRNA vaccine for their third dose or booster shots.

What's the difference?

A third dose is not the same as a booster. For people who do not develop the same immune response to the first two doses of the vaccine (some people who are moderately to severely immunocompromised), a third dose is needed to get a similar level of protection as others in the population. For these people, receiving a third dose to complete the initial vaccine series can help individuals create antibodies to protect them from COVID-19.

A booster dose is an additional non-urgent vaccine you may choose to get at a later date if the protection from the initial two-dose vaccine series begins to decrease over time. A booster gets immunity back up to a desirable level of protection for an extended period of time.

Booking a third dose or booster

To book a booster:

- Be registered in the <u>Get Vaccinated system</u>
- Book online when notified

• Call 1-833-838-2323 if there is difficulty accessing online booking

People needing a third dose <u>will be contacted</u> by the provincial Get Vaccinated system about how and when to book a third dose, about four weeks after you receive your second dose.

Booster shots and third doses will be by appointment only, they are not available for walk-ins.

Mandatory vaccinations for all health care workers in effect

On September 13, 2021, the Provincial Health Officer (PHO) announced that all employees, medical staff and other service providers who work in identified care locations in the health sector will be required to be fully (two doses) vaccinated against COVID-19 by October 26, 2021. This order is now in effect.

Overdose prevention and response

Overdose response: Naloxone saves lives

Toxic drugs continue to circulate throughout our region causing overdose events and deaths. Given the contamination of the illicit drug supply overdoses can look different and may take more naloxone to respond. It is vital that family, friends and loved ones of people who use drugs are familiar with the signs and symptoms of overdose, have naloxone and know how to respond.

Flu season is quickly approaching

Getting the influenza vaccination is more important than ever this year, especially with a health authority already experiencing a COVID-19 surge.

With more people returning to the workplace, children back in school and changes to public health mandates, it is expected to see an increase of influenza cases this year compared to last year.

Peak influenza season is from December to February, and it takes a minimum of two weeks for antibodies against the flu to develop fully following vaccination. Northern Health will start offering influenza vaccine beginning the week of October 18, 2021. For more information about flu vaccination, please see:
