Looking for COVID-19 testing and self-isolation information? Here's where to go

COVID-19 immunization plan

Pediatric dose

The Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is now available for children 5 to 11. This vaccine uses a lower dose (10 micrograms), at one-third of the dose formulated for older children and adults, which will provide effective protection tailored to children's immune systems. The National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) advises that children receive a two-dose series of the vaccine with an interval of eight weeks or more between the first and second dose.

Third dose

The third dose of the COVID-19 vaccination is for some people who are moderately to severely immunocompromised. People who need a third dose <u>will be contacted</u> by the provincial <u>Get</u> <u>Vaccinated</u> system.

Third dose immunizations will be by appointment only, they are not available for walk-ins.

Booster dose

The booster dose is an additional non-urgent, non-compulsory vaccine that gets immunity back up to a desirable level of protection for an extended period of time. It will be available starting in January 2022.

To book a booster dose, please ensure you're registered in the <u>Get Vaccinated</u> system. If you have difficulty accessing online booking, please call 1-833-838-2323.

Booster dose shots will be by appointment only, they are not available for walk-ins.

COVID-19 orders

NH regional Public Health Orders revised; worship services allowed with vaccination Northern Health (NH) is updating public health orders for Gatherings and Events, to align with Provincial Health Officer Orders, and to allow worship services with COVID-19 safety requirements in place, including vaccination.

The regional public health orders covering all of the NH region are in response to sustained rates of COVID-19 activity and the impact on health care resources.

The revised NH Gatherings and Events COVID-19 Order takes effect at midnight, December 10, 2021, and will be in place until at least January 31, 2022, while NH and provincial public

health officials continue to evaluate levels of COVID-19 activity and ongoing impacts on the health care system, individuals, and communities.

Under the recent changes, faith-based organizations will be allowed to resume in-person worship services, as long as they are limited to 50% capacity in the place of worship and all participants over the age of 11 are vaccinated. Virtual or drive-in services can be held without a check of vaccination status.

The revised order also removes proof of vaccination requirements for outside events, in line with provincial measures.

COVID-19 Numbers

As of December 14, **18,089** cases have been reported in the NH region since the beginning of the pandemic.

- Cases currently active: **213**
- New cases: 34
- Currently in hospital: 15
 - Currently in ICU level care in hospital: 8
- Deaths in the NH region since the beginning of the pandemic: 266

Overdose prevention and response

BC Coroner Report updated: January – October 2021, and record number of naloxone kits ordered

BC's Coroners Service updated 2021 illicit drug toxicity deaths to include October 2021

- 201 suspected illicit drug toxicity deaths in October 2021, the highest number recorded in a month
- Total of 1,782 suspected illicit drug toxicity deaths between January and October 2021, the highest ever recorded in a calendar year
- Fentanyl or its analogues detected in 84 per cent of all illicit drug toxicity deaths, with a greater number of cases with extreme fentanyl concentrations
- No deaths reported at supervised consumption or overdose prevention sites

- No indication that prescribed safe supply is contributing to illicit drug deaths

October 2021 - A record number of Take Home Naloxone (THN) kits (over 43,500) were shipped by Toward the Heart

- 94,522 naloxone kits were reported as used to reverse an overdose since August 2012
- Over half of kits distributed were reported as replacements for a used kit
- 83 per cent of people who received kits were people who used substances
- This highlights that people with lived and living experience are the ones getting kits and using them to save the lives of their friends and community members
